

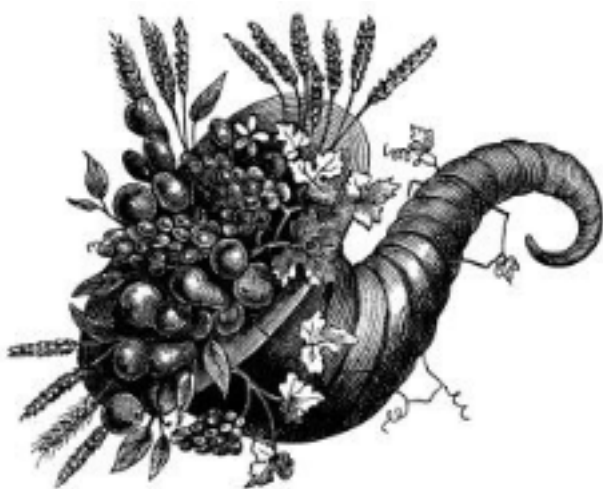

2025 Homecraft Division Rules

- 1 There will be NO exhibitor's fee in any class. EVERY EXHIBITOR will pay admission at the gate.
- 2 All entries must be arranged for judging Thursday, September 11, between 7:00 - 9:00 p.m., and between 8:00 - 11:30 a.m., Friday, September 12. Hall will be closed at 11:30 a.m. Judging commences at 12:30 p.m. Exhibitors are responsible for their entries being placed in the right class prior to judging.
- 3 All exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor. The same exhibit may be shown only twice before being disqualified.
- 4 Exhibitors are allowed only one entry in each section.
- 5 Men and women exhibitors are welcome in all classes, unless specified.
- 6 All soiled, defaced or old work will not be judged or displayed. If entries are not worthy of a prize, no prize will be given. The judge's decision will be final.
- 7 No exhibits may be removed from the hall until 5:00 p.m. on Saturday, September 13, 2025.
- 8 The Directors or Society will not be responsible for goods broken or lost, but will render every possible assistance toward recovery.
- 9 New Exhibitor is anyone who has not shown in 2023 or 2024. Mark your tag "NEW EXHIBITOR" on the front.
- 10 Please note special rules of each class.
- 11 "Homecraft Award" will be awarded to the exhibitor accumulating the highest number of points in the following sections of Homecraft Division: Plants & Flowers, Culinary Arts, Bottled Goods, Needlecraft, Handcrafts, Photography and Art. The exhibitor must have won a prize in at least two different classes. Points accumulated in Seniors, Juniors, Special Needs, Antiques and Vegetables do not count towards the trophy.
- 12 Placing in specials does not count in the point system. Point system used to decide winners will be: First - 3 points; Second - 2 points; Third - 1 point.
- 13 An Organization or Society may exhibit by obtaining an exhibitor number, filling in the entry form and signing the Hold Harmless Agreement.
- 14 For more information, entry tickets or an entry form, please go to a New Tecumseth Library.
- 15 Exhibitors winning any specials are to pick up the prize from the convenor, on Saturday, September 13, from 5:00 - 6:00 p.m., or from the Fair Office on Sunday, September 14, from 10:00 a.m. - noon. The Fair Office is located in the Kate Aitken Building (Rotary Hall).
- 16 Should it be necessary, the Beeton & District Agricultural Society reserves the right to substitute a prize for another of approximately the same value. Any Inquiries regarding sponsor prizes should be directed to the President.

RULES

- 1 All flowers in section 1-28 must be grown by exhibitor.
- 2 Arrangements, not necessary to be grown by exhibitor.
- 3 All plants must be at least 3 months old, one plant per pot unless otherwise specified.
- 4 Exhibitors to supply own container.
- 5 Count blooms carefully, no more, no less. Buds showing colour count as blooms.
- 6 Let's see plants larger than the pots.
- 7 Be a neat and tidy exhibitor.
- 8 Cut flowers **must be shown with own foliage**.
- 9 Height of arrangement should be at least 1 ½ times the size of the container.
- 10 No artificial flowers or plants, and no luster spray to be used.
- 11 Tag to be placed at front of arrangement.
- 12 New exhibitor or anyone who did not show in 2023 or 2024, mark tag "NEW EXHIBITOR" on the front.
- 13 All other rules of Homecraft Division apply.
- 14 For more information on flowers and plants, see publication #34 "Horticulture Judging Standards" from OMAFRA.
- 15 Container not to exceed 12" top (does not apply to arrangements).

SECTION: CUT FLOWERS

Prizes for section 1-28: 1ST: \$4 2ND: \$3.50 3RD: \$3

- 1 Asters - 5 stems
- 2 Marigolds - any variety, 5 stems
- 3 Hosta - small, any variety, 3 leaves
- 4 Hosta - largest, any variety, 1 leaf
- 5 Sedum - Autumn Joy, 1 stem
- 6 Dahlia - common variety, one colour or mixed colour, 3 stems
- 7 Dahlia - decorative, any colour, 1 stem
- 8 Dahlia - largest, 1 stem
- 9 Gladiolus - 1 stem in suitable container
- 10 Salvia - 3 stems, any colour
- 11 Rudbeckia - 3 stems
- 12 Sunflowers - 3 stems
- 13 Rose - 1 spray
- 14 Single Rose - floating in maximum 6" bowl
- 15 Rose - most fragrant
- 16 Snapdragon - tall, 3 stems
- 17 Amaranthus - 1 stem
- 18 Zinnia - 5 stems, mixed colour
- 19 Any other cut flower not listed above, 1 stem

SECTION: PLANTS

- 20 Sansevieria (Snake Plant), max 10" diameter pot
- 21 Strawflower - any colour, max 10" diameter pot
- 22 Coleus - max 10" diameter pot
- 23 African Violet in container
- 24 Cactus or Succulent - max 6" diameter pot
- 25 Any foliage houseplant, max 6" diameter pot
- 26 Potted Herb garden - 4 varieties
- 27 Forced branch in leaf - max 24", in suitable container
- 28 Terrarium, not to exceed 12" in height or width

SECTION: ARRANGEMENTS

Prizes for section 29-35: 1ST: \$4. 2ND: \$3.50 3RD: \$3.

- 29 "Wayside", wild flower arrangement, using only wild flowers, seed pods and grasses.
- 30 "Mini Magic", a miniature design using all dry materials, not to exceed 5" in any direction. Prize: donated by the Cooper family in memory of Deborah Cooper.
- 31 "Last Blast", a design of your choice using only flowers and foliage from your garden.
- 32 "Let's Be Thankful", centerpiece, not to exceed 8" high and 16" in length.
- 33 "Gone to Seed", a design using seed pods, bark, grasses etc.
- 34 "Happy New Year", a small design in a wine glass.
- 35 "Canadian Autumn", an all foliage design without the use of oasis.

- 1 Absolutely no mixes or canned fillings.
- 2 Cakes: remove from pans; on sturdy cardboard 1" larger than the base of cake (unless otherwise specified); iced with any suitable homemade icing - no store bought.
- 3 Pie plates no larger than 9", may be smaller.
- 4 All muffins must have paper cups removed. Tea biscuits, buns, rolls, tarts, cookies, squares and candies MUST be on a sturdy paper plate and placed in a clear plastic food storage bag. No plastic wrap or tin foil.
- 5 Quick bread, approx. 4x8", MUST be on a sturdy cardboard and placed in a clear plastic food storage bag.
- 6 Attach tag to plate, not plastic bag.
- 7 New exhibitor or anyone who did not show in the Culinary Arts Section in 2023 or 2024, mark tag "NEW EXHIBITOR" on the front.
- 8 All other rules of Homecraft Division apply.
